2. ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Mayor Jack M. Scoville, Jr. requested all cell phones or electronic devices be turned off or placed on mute so as to not interrupt the meeting.

3. PUBLIC HEARING

The purpose of the Public Hearing is to receive citizen input concerning an ordinance to amend the Freedom of Information Act Fee Schedule.

Mayor Scoville opened the Public Hearing at 5:34 pm to receive citizen input concerning an ordinance to amend the Freedom of Information Act Fee Schedule. Mayor Scoville recognized Mr. Fred Williams. Mr. Williams asked for an explanation. Mrs. Elise Crosby stated the City conformed to State law with the new FOIA and amendments to the Act. Some of the fees increased and some decreased. Mayor Scoville said this complies with the State Statue that went into effect earlier this year. Mayor Scoville announced other individuals who signed the roster declined.

4. INVOCATION & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Pro Tempore Brendon Barber rendered the invocation. Mayor Scoville led the Pledge of Allegiance.

5. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mayor Scoville opened the Public Comments and recognized Mr. Lee Padgett who addressed Council concerning an incident involving campaign signs and stated he fears for the safety of the political signs during the upcoming election. He asked the City Administrator to assure the citizens election signs are safe on private property and those (signs) the candidates have placed illegally are safe as well. He asked if illegally placed campaign signs are considered litter.

Mayor Scoville recognized Ms. Jeanette Ard who addressed Council concerning TIF. Ms. Ard stated she is not against Tax Increment Financing. "It's been done well in some areas and it's been done terribly in other areas." She said questions need to be answered and asked how it would interact with bonds the schools have for new construction. How would this fit in with the County's Visions plan? She requested Council consider holding public hearings.

Mayor Scoville recognized Mr. Fred Williams. Mr. Williams stated he is President of the West End Citizens Council and addressed Council about the salary and retirement salary of a city employee who retired and returned to work. His group would like clarification on how the process worked. Mayor Scoville said he would be glad to meet with the group and explain the process.

Mayor Scoville recognized Mr. Brett Phillips who addressed Council concerning the steel mill. Mr. Phillips noted the first obligation of City Council is public health and safety of the citizens. He expressed concern about the air quality if the steel mill reopens. In addition, he said there needs to be a lot more transparency concerning discussions between the City and Liberty. The steel mill is an old business that has repeatedly failed and left workers in the City without jobs. He offered the roof of his garage as a site for an air quality monitor.

Mr. Alan Loveless introduced Mr. Hunter Coker. He was hired last month as a Class line technician. Chief Kelvin Waites welcomed back Officer Joshua Lawson. Officer Lawson has been serving his country stationed in Guantanamo Bay for over a year. Mr. Tim Chatman introduced Mr. Byron Ruffin, and Mr. Hakeem Knowlin who are employed in Waste Management and Mr. Neal McKenzie the new City custodian.

Due to recent information that was forthcoming from Liberty House, Mayor Scoville announced items 8A, 8B and 8C (below) previously listed on the agenda will be addressed at a later date. Council Member Butts called for Point of Order and said the items were included on the agenda received prior to the meeting and a motion has to be made to remove the items. Mayor Scoville and the City Attorney noted an amended agenda removing the three items was published more than 24 hours in advance of the meeting.

Mrs. Debra Bivens stated this Revenue Bond is for improvements to the Electric Department Peak Shaving Project and the Front Street upgrades. Five bids were received today and BB&T was the successful bank. The interest rate is 2.2%, which is less than the amount budgeted. There is a bank charge of \$5,000, but no origination fee.

13. WATER DEPARTMENT

A. Motion to approve repairs to the stormwater pump and payment to Coastal Hydraulics in the amount of \$73,738.01.

Council Member Jayroe moved, seconded by Council Member Joseph. Mr. Will Cook stated one of the two pumps located at the Front and Fraser Streets pond had significant deterioration. The pump was removed on August 14, 2017 and sent to Coastal Hydraulics in Charleston for diagnosis. Due to the urgency of the situation this is considered an emergency repair. The item has been added to the agenda for approval to proceed with repairs to the pump. Mr. Cook recommends the stainless steel fittings rather than the standard steel fittings. Standard steel was originally used and there was no corrosion protection, which led to the deterioration. There was a 5 year warranty on the pump and it has been 5 ½ years since it was installed. This is not a budgeted item in the current budget.

Mr. Gardner reported construction of Fire Station 2 is moving along. ~ Staff is in the process of analyzing engineers for the Front Street redesign of our electric grid. A recommendation will be presented at the next workshop. ~ A recommendation for the engineering work for the bulkhead at Constitution Park will also be presented at the workshop. ~ The sandbag wall behind Front Street on the riverside will remain through the king tide season. A more permanent solution will be establish in partnership with the County. ~ Construction of 35 parking spaces for boats and trailers at East Bay Park is underway. ~ Bids received on the East Bay Park

recreational trail were scary, with the lowest bid from a local contractor near \$250,000. Staff is looking to re-engineer the project. ~ The major work on SBR2 should be completed next week. ~ The Christmas Parade will be December 2, 2017. The Embers will be planning downtown that night. ~ Tonight's meeting is dedicated to the honor of Sammy Green, a 41 year employee of the City who passed away. His wake is Friday evening and funeral on Saturday. Sammy's gentle spirit will be missed.

Council Member Smalls expressed concern about the potholes on the streets. He said the cold patch does not work and is a waste of time. Mr. Gardner said when Public Works receives reports of potholes, a 'report to repair' is sent to SCDOT. Mr. Smalls said the City may need to handle the work.

Council Member Joseph thanked City staff for a job well done during Hurricane Irma.

Council Member Butts asked about yard debris. Mr. Tim Chatman said his Department looks at every area as a priority and crews are addressing every part of the City. A more workable schedule is being developed so citizens know when their debris will be picked up. This process will begin Monday. The nice weather after the storm has encouraged people to clean their yards. Once this debris is picked up, within a matter of hours more debris is back on the curb in front of the same yard. The new schedule will be able to address this matter.

Mayor Scoville asked about the process and cost of monitoring the air quality in the City. Mr. Gardner stated previously DHEC was monitoring at Howard but did not know if that is still operating. He said the City could partner with Hobcaw or Coastal Carolina to get some baseline of air quality before the mill reopens. Council Member Kimbrough stated we need to do this ourselves. Mayor Scoville asked for specifics on going forward with this at the next workshop. Council Member Butts wants to insure this is not a road block for the steel mill. He said air quality monitoring

should be across the board for International Paper Company and Santee Electric Coop as well. Council Member Jayroe said it is very evident we know we need air monitoring.

A. COUNCIL MAY TAKE ACTION ON ITEMS DISCUSSED IN EXECUTIVE SESSION

B. Motion to Approve Agreement with Carey F. Smith For Professional Consulting Services Related To Economic Development Matters For Sixty Days At An Amount Not To Exceed \$12,000.00.

Council Member Jayroe moved, seconded by Council Member Joseph. Mr. Gardner said he believes it is prudent for the City to seek advice concerning economic development and potential opportunities from an individual who has been involved in development for 40 years. The City is at a point where we are looking at the investment of millions of dollars. Mr. Gardner said it would be wise for the City to receive advice to protect the citizens and the best struck deal for the City of Georgetown. Mr. Smith has a love for Georgetown and an interest in seeing it thrive and succeed and is willing to help us out. We pay for a level of expertise whether it is lawyers, engineers, etc. Mr. Gardner stated this would be a short term window to support staff as some of the economic development opportunities are developed. These funds are budgeted. Mayor Pro Tempore Barber said the City is on its second Economic Development Director and a City Administrator. He does not want to stand in the way of the economic development progress because it will be beneficial to the citizens. If we are in a position where we have to depend on economic development advice from the outside... Mr. Barber said Carey Smith is one of the most highly qualified city administrators/city managers that he has ever worked with. He respects him as a professional and a friend. We are at a point where we have to stop taxing the citizens for additional money when we are supposed to have folks in house that can handle this. Council Member Joseph asked Mr. Gardner why the City needs to contract with Mr. Smith as a consultant. Mr. Gardner stated the City has very talented staff and we will make the deals happen with or without this agreement. He feels this will give the City a much stronger position to deal with. Council Member Kimbrough said it is a complicated procedure. We have to be prepared as a City to move forward. If we don't have the right players on our team we will have to do something about that at some point, too. I would hate to see any opportunity fall through the cracks because of our inability to provide the necessary information; on the other hand, we have the responsibility to our citizens and taxpayers. We are paying salaries throughout the City for jobs that are being done. Sometimes jobs are learned by fire; you jump in. He feels we should be able to figure this out and make it happen. Mayor Scoville said back before the bubble burst, we had a Planning Director who would handle these kinds of issues and compliment the other City staff. We have discussed some projects that are going to be complicated and involve financing, engineering issues, public/private issues, etc. When the bubble burst and all the projects dried up, we decided to save money and

not fill the position. As a result, we do not have anyone on staff that knows these issues, it's not economic development, rather financial issues and expertise on the big projects. He said this would augment and supplement City staff. Many of the projects being discussed will require hiring engineering or consulting firms. We will spend a lot of time and effort re-inventing the wheel when Mr. Smith is here and willing to help. Council Member Butts stated engineers who will be hired are part of the process. He said hiring another person to assist with the economic development isn't part of our process. He noted the Administrator said we can and we will make things happen the way they should with or without Mr. Smith. Mr. Butts said if that is Mr. Gardner's sentiments, we need to move forward with what we have and what the taxpayers are paying for. Mayor Scoville said we are going to need this area of expertise, which we don't have, and ultimately will cost us. By not doing this now, it will cost more in the long run. Council Member Jayroe said according to what Council is hearing, it is a much better situation to have better advice on these projects. We have given the Administrator 'full speed ahead, let's move forward' on the development issues. She is disappointed we do not have staff that can handle this in a way they feel comfortable. We cannot let these opportunities go because of a two month consulting fee. Council Member Smalls said a few years ago there was an opportunity for one or two of the projects discussed. They did not happen and he holds Council responsible. Staff is 'loaded down', the money is budgeted and he is ready for the vote. Council Member Joseph said this issue does not have anything to do with whether our staff is competent enough to handle the matter. He said it is a question of the enormity of what we are trying to do in the City, the number of different projects discussed and the fact there is someone who has such specific and detailed knowledge of what we need help with. He feels it is a benefit we have available to us. Council Member Butts questioned what the City is gaining with a sixty day scope of work. He does not understand why two months would be the answer for issues going forward with economic development. Mr. Gardner said his goal is to prove it is successful strategy. If it is not successful, we abandon. If it is successful and projects are on track and moving to the degree Council is satisfied, he would argue the \$5,000 (sic) a month is not an issue. When asked by Council Member Smalls, Mr. Gardner said we pay for professional opinions all the time. During the sixty days Mr. Gardner will report on progress being made, providing conceptual drawings of the project and agreeing on incentives City Council feels comfortable with; the public good is served more by whatever incentive is offered. Extending the offer is a possibility if it is needed to continue the progress being made.
